January Speaker Julia Fikse, Quilt Ninja



Julia Fikse has 25 years of experience in the textile industry as a designer, garment maker, textile creator, graphic artist, entrepreneur, clothing and accessory manufacturer, and business leader. Julia has a B.S. Degree in Design from the University of California at Davis, with a minor in Textiles and Clothing.

She has trained and worked as a trend forecaster, designer, colorist and dye coordinator at Levi Strauss and Co., Gymboree, and Adidas. She has owned and operated her own clothing company for over 14 years.

Julia is an AQS Certified quilt appraiser based in Los Angeles, and currently holds memberships in a variety of quilt-related organizations including American Quilter Society, Modern Quilt Guild, Valley Modern Quilters, San Fernando Valley Quilter's Association, PAAQT and American Quilter's Society.

Her January presentation will be "Quilt Appraisal, Repair & Trunk Show"

This one hour interactive, fun, and informative lecture will teach you the value of appraisals and answer the question, "Should I get my quilt

appraised?" Included in this lecture is information about how to care for and repair quilts. Then, enjoy looking at quilts through the ages with Julia's collection of quilts from 1860 to the present with an interactive discussion about fabric dating, condition and caring for your quilt and the historical significance of quilting past and present.

Come to the January meeting early (6:40). Julia will be doing a bed-turning of some quilts brought in by our members. You can be right there as she analyzes quilts and talks about what an appraiser specifically looks at when she/he evaluates the value of a quilt. These will not be formal, i.e. paid-for, appraisals. You will be able to ask questions as you and Julia get up-close-and-personal with each quilt. Time is limited, so call Lynn Slosson if you want to bring a quilt for the bed-turning.

What is a “Round Robin”?

RR is a learning exercise the guild does every other year to help us develop as quilters. Each participant submits a block of some sort to be the starting point. That block can be any old thing – a bit of large print fabric, a test block from a quilt already done, an unfinished something from a class, a block received in an exchange that may or may not be to your taste. Basically anything that doesn't need to be in your closet anymore. In our case it should be less than 18" square.

At the January meeting, the committee assigns a number to your block and puts it in a bag so that it looks like every other submission. This is so that nobody knows who has what each month except the committee. You may also bring a bit of fabric to put in the bag. There will be a piece of paper with a place for your name and number as well as a space for each contributor to sign. Please be sure to sign it each month. Then you are given a bag with someone else's block on which you will add a border. The paper put in the bag will give some direction about what to add each month.

Keep in mind that you are not finishing this quilt. Someone else will be putting on another border next month. The bag with quilt, paper and any fabric must be turned in EACH MONTH February

through April. Each month you will be given a different bag to take home to work on.

In May, when you turn in your last bag, we will hang everything up. It's a learning experience for everyone to see how challenges were met, how we all look at color and design differently. You will want to see how your block inspired others AND how what you added to someone else's work was interpreted by the next person. This is how we all get to learn from fellow guild members.

What Round Robin is NOT

This year's RR will not be judged. There will be no voting for “best” RR. Do not bring in a center block you especially care about; RR is not a way to end up with a masterpiece with someone else doing most of the work. RR does not need to end up a finished anything. RR is not a solo effort each month – ask your friends for ideas. You will not be required to stand up and talk about what you have done if you don't want to.

The proviso is that you are also responsible for claiming any items which you have brought which did not find a new home.



We Could Use Your Help

Since Road to California first began 25 years ago, quilt show volunteers have played an important role in maintaining not only the integrity of the quilt show but sharing their love for quilting with our guests. Many of Road's quilt show volunteers are returning volunteers; they enjoy their volunteering experience so much that they are anxious to return year after year. However, as the show grows and more guests attend, the need for volunteers also grows.

Road volunteers receive special "perks" for their service. All quilt show volunteers who volunteer a minimum of 2 hours receive a multi-day admission for Road 2021. Volunteer a minimum of 4 hours and receive a coveted "Roadies Bar" for the official Road to California pin in addition to the 2021 multi-day admission. And for volunteers who serve 6 or more hours, they receive all of the above plus they have the option for Road 2021 Priority Registration.

Opportunities to volunteer include helping with unpacking quilts for the quilt competition viewing; photography assistants; setting up special exhibits; white glove hosts; and take down of quilts after the show. Workshop with Dora Cary




Lover's Knot

February Block for SVQG

Similar in appearance to Churn Dash...this version of a Lover's Knot Block is a very easy one to make! It's a 12" block!

I think the colors should be pinks, lavenders and purples with a light coordinating background. *Phyllis*




Supplies:

- Light pink (#1a) one 2-1/2" x 14" strip
- Light pink (#1b) one 5-7/8" x 11-3/4" strip.
- Dark pink (#2) one 5-7/8" x 11-3/4" strip
- Green (#3) one 2-1/2" x 10" strip

Directions:


First cut strip #1a into four 2-1/2" x 3-1/2" rectangles.

Next cut Strip #3 into four 2-1/2" squares...



Now speed piece the half squares by stacking the Color #1b and Color #2 strips right sides together. On the back of the top strip lightly mark the diagonals and the 5-7/8" square line, and sew a scant 1/4" above and below the diagonal lines. Cut apart on the marked diagonals, and on the square line. Press seam allowances towards the darker fabric. This will give you four half squares. Trim these back to measure 5-1/2" if needed...

Next sew a Color #3 2-1/2" square to one end of each Color #1 2-1/2" x 3-1/2" rectangle...





Sew one of the rectangle strips to the right side of a large half square, referring to the diagram below left for orientation of the pieces. Add another half square to the other side of the rectangle strip. Press seam allowances towards the center strip. Make two of these units...

Now sew the extra Color #1 2-1/2" square between the last two rectangle units. Press seam allowances towards the outer rectangles.

Piece the block in the order shown at left, alternating pressing directions as you add rows.

Below is a simple quilt, with sashing around the blocks, two thin borders strips, and a narrow binding.



Block Party for January



Think about a cold winter night, with the fireplace glowing and a soothing cup of hot tea. Thoughts of quilting come to mind.

You decide to piece together a log cabin that characterizes the early morning sky of January!

LOG CABIN in whites and blues:


The instructions for this log cabin are very simple. Note - use 1/4" seam to join pieces together.

- Start with various strips of white cut into 1 1/2" widths - needs to be as long as possible.
- Repeat above with various colors of blue, use very light to very dark.
- Cut one dark blue 1 1/2" square - this is your center square.
- Cut one light blue 1 1/2" square, join to square above using 1/4" seam allowance. This represents the top and starting piece.
- Next attach a 1 1/2" strip. Measure square for required length. Example: this strip will be 2 1/2" long
- The next pieces are the whites. Repeat this process of two white and two blue until you have a square that measures 9-1/2" unfinished.
